Support plan is a better description of what the process should be about and doesn't give the same negative connotations that can be associated with assessing someone's ability to care. The support plan can give a much more comprehensive tool which includes all areas of the Carers life including the opportunity to concentrate on their own health and wellbeing.	
	It is believed that a Carers Support Plan will enable Carers to access information and support at an earlier stage, preventing crisis and greater cost at a later stage. Support Plans should be developed in conjunction with 3 rd Sector partners making them more widely available and accessible. However this should be done in partnership with the local authority and detail preventative / early intervention support rather than focussing purely on what can be provided through Social Work services.
