# **Cancer Patient Experience Survey 2015**

Results for NHS Borders



June 2016, Official Statistics









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This report gives a summary of the results of the NHS Scotland Cancer Patient Experience Survey 2015 for patients who were treated by NHS Borders.

Survey questionnaires were sent out in October 2015 to 112 patients who were diagnosed with cancer between 1st July 2013 and 31st March 2014 and who received cancer treatment and care within NHS Borders between 1st January 2014 and 30th September 2014.

The survey asked questions about people's experiences of diagnosis, treatment, support, operations, in / outpatient care and home care / support. You can find a full copy of the survey at:

81 NHS Borders patients (72%) returned feedback on their experiences. Of those patients willing to provide information about themselves:

- 28% were male and 72% were female.
- 0% were aged 16 25; 0% were aged 26 35; 5% were aged 36 50; 39% were aged 51 65; 27% were aged 66 75 and 29% were aged 76 and over.
- 57% did not have any limiting illness or disability.

The survey was commissioned by the Scottish Government as part of the Scottish Care Experience Survey Programme, which aims to use the public's experiences of health and care services to improve those services. The survey was jointly funded by Macmillan Cancer Support and the Scottish Government and was managed by the Scottish Government in partnership with Macmillan Cancer Support and ISD Scotland (part of NHS National Services Scotland). The survey fieldwork was carried out by Quality Health Ltd.

The results of the survey will be used by NHS Borders and the Scottish Government to improve the quality of cancer care in Scotland by focusing on the areas that patients tell us are important to them and where they consider improvements could be made.

Please note that many of the patients who responded to the survey will have had contact with a variety of treatment centres / hospitals during their cancer journey, therefore some of their experiences may relate to treatment or care that took place outside of NHS Borders. Please also note that results for questions 1 - 3 (seeing your GP), 55 - 56 and 58 (home care and support) are based on responses from patients who were resident within NHS Borders at the time of their cancer diagnosis / treatment. This differs from the other results in this report, which are based on responses from patients who received their hospital treatment in this NHS Board.

### **Chapter 1. Overall Results for NHS Borders**

The tables / charts in this chapter show how patients treated within this NHS Board responded to questions about their cancer care. Results for this NHS Board are shown alongside the results for NHS Scotland as a whole.

Two types of table / chart are shown in this chapter:

- (a) The first type of table / chart shows how positively or negatively patients responded to questions. For each question, the percentages of positive, neutral / mixed and negative responses are shown. Please see Appendix A for a full breakdown of how patients' responses were grouped into the positive, neutral / mixed or negative categories.
- (b) The second type of table / chart reports the percentage of respondents who selected a particular response in relation to a question. These types of questions are designed to gather background information about respondents (for example, how often a patient visited his / her GP prior to attending hospital for cancer care).

#### Notes on Interpretation

**Number of responses** - the number of patients treated within this NHS Board who provided a valid response to the question. Note that respondents who indicated that a question was not relevant, or who did not know the answer, are not included in these results. Where a result to a question does not appear within this section it has been suppressed due to the low number of valid responses (fewer than 20).

**Response (%)** - the percentage of positive, neutral / mixed and negative responses received for the question from patients treated within this NHS Board. For example, when asked how he / she felt about the length of time he / she had to wait for an appointment, the percentage positive refers to patients who felt they were seen as soon as necessary. Where patients said they should have been seen a lot sooner these responses have been counted as negative. Where patients said they should have been seen a bit sooner their responses have been counted as neutral / mixed. The coloured bars illustrate the percentage positive as green and the percentage negative as red. Where answers were neither positive nor negative (neutral / mixed) the percentage is shown in yellow. Note that results have been rounded to the nearest whole percentage and this occasionally results in the sum of positive, neutral and negative percentages not adding up to exactly 100%.

% Positive - the percent positive result; the total percentage of patients treated within this NHS Board who responded positively to the question.

**Difference from NHS Scotland -** the difference between this NHS Board's percent positive result and the equivalent result for NHS Scotland (for example, -2 means that the result for this NHS Board is two percentage points lower than for NHS Scotland as a whole).

- <sup>s</sup> Indicates a statistically significant difference in the percent positive result between this NHS Board and NHS Scotland as a whole.
- NT Indicates that a significance test was not carried out because fewer than five respondents within this NHS Board selected a positive response or because fewer than five respondents within this NHS Board selected a negative / neutral response.


**Median rating** - the "average" rating that respondents gave their overall care within this NHS Board. Patients were asked to rate their care on a scale between 0 (Very poor) and 10 (Very good). To calculate the median, ratings from all respondents are listed in numerical order; the median rating is the middle value within that list, with half the ratings placed equal to or above the median and half placed equal to or below the median. The higher the median, the more positive the "average" rating.



### 1.1 Overall Care

Patients were asked to rate their overall care on a scale between 0 (Very poor) and 10 (Very good). Ratings of 7 - 10 have been categorised as positive; ratings of 4 - 6 have been categorised as neutral / mixed; ratings of 0 - 3 have been categorised as negative.




















