

Registered Blind and Partially Sighted Persons, Scotland 2010

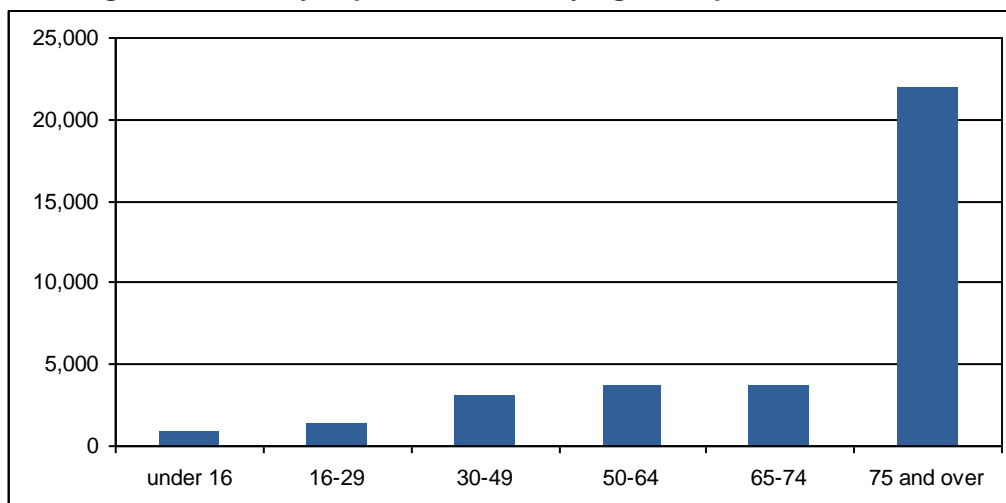


Introduction and key points

The purpose of this Statistics Release is to present national figures on visually impaired persons registered with Local Authorities in Scotland. All figures relate to the 31st March 2010 and are provisional and, as such, may be subject to change. The final figures will be published in future publications.

Registration with Local Authorities for blind and partially sighted persons is not compulsory. Research studies suggest that between a quarter and a third of visually impaired people are in fact registered with Local Authorities (see background note for more details).

Information collected on visually impaired persons show that: -

- In 2010, the number of people registered as blind or partially sighted was estimated to be 34,492.
- There were 2,985 cases registered during the period 1 April 2009 to 31 March 2010, an increase of 1.7 per cent on 2009.
- The majority, 55 per cent, of those on the register were blind, 45 per cent were partially sighted.
- 39 per cent of those on the register were male and 61 per cent were female.
- Three-quarters (75 per cent) of those registered were over the age of 65.
- 11,158 persons (32 per cent) of those registered as visually impaired had additional disabilities. Of these, nearly a quarter were deaf (22 per cent).

Section 1: Blind Persons

There were 18,942 registered blind persons in 2010. The number registered blind has shown a drop of just over three per cent over the last year. This continues the trend of small, but steady falls since 2000. (See background note for more details).

The number of new cases registered during the year was 1,160. This is down by over seven per cent on the previous year.

In 2010, there were 3.6 people registered blind for every 1,000 people in the population of Scotland (see table 1a).

Just under three-quarters of registered blind persons are over the age of 65, with approximately two-thirds being over 75. There are significantly more women registered blind (61 per cent) than men (39 per cent).

Almost 44 per cent of all registered blind people are women aged 75 and over (see table 1b). This is also reflected in the new registrations where around 42 per cent of the new registered cases are women aged 75 and over.

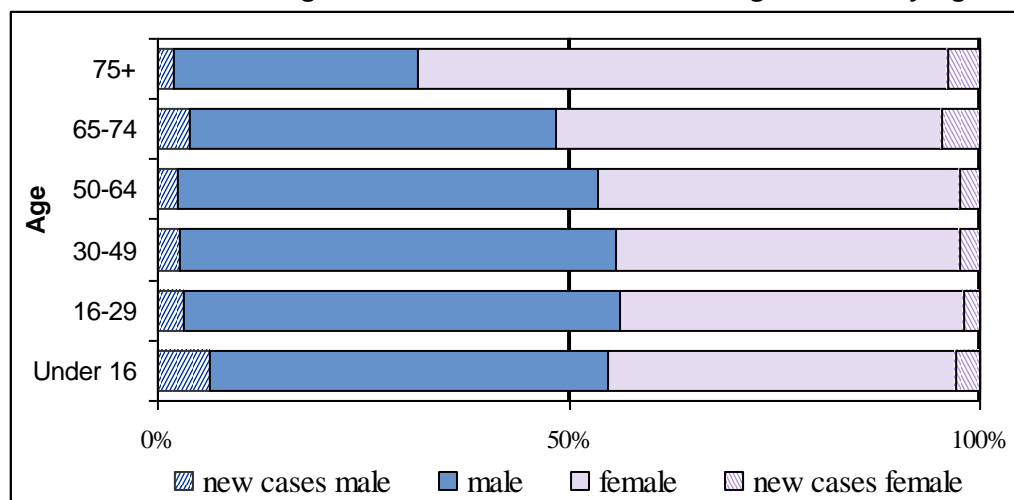
Excluding the '75 and over' age group there is a much more even split between the sexes. (See Table 1b & Chart 1b).

The number of registered blind people per 1,000 population is 3.6 for the whole of Scotland. This varies from 1.5 in Aberdeenshire to 6.0 in the City of Glasgow. A more detailed breakdown showing the rate per 1,000 population by age and sex for each Local Authority is available in Annex A on page 9.

An estimated 6,572 (35 per cent) of all registered blind persons have additional disabilities, nearly a quarter of which are deaf (22 per cent). Over 71 per cent of those with additional disabilities were over the age of 65 (see Table 1c).

Section 2: Partially Sighted Persons

There were an estimated 15,550 registered partially sighted persons in 2010. This is very slightly up on last year (0.1 per cent). The number of people registered as partially sighted has been steadily rising over the last 11 years to 2006 with a slight dip in numbers in 2007, increasing again in 2008. The number of new cases registered during the year was 1,825. This is up nine per cent on the previous year. The number of people registered partially sighted per 1,000 population is 3.0 for this year. This has remained at around the same level since 2003. (see Table 2a).

Data on registered partially sighted individuals shows a similar picture to that of registered blind individuals. Approximately three-quarters (74 per cent) of registered partially sighted persons are over the age of 65, with approximately two-thirds (63 per cent) being aged 75 or over. There are significantly more women registered as partially sighted (62 per cent) than men (38 per cent). Again, just under half (44 per cent) of all registered partially sighted people are women aged 75 and over (see table 2b).

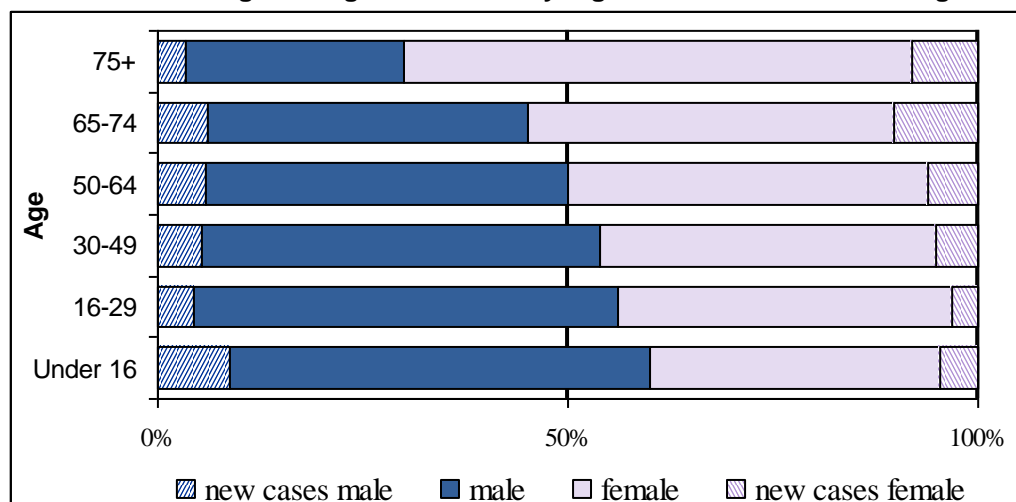
This large proportion of partially sighted women aged 75 or over is also mirrored in the new registrations where 42 per cent of the new registered cases are women aged 75 and over. Excluding the '75 and over' age group there is a much more even split between the sexes (see Table 2b & Chart 2b).

The number of people registered partially sighted per 1,000 population is 3.0 for the whole of Scotland. This varies from 1.6 in Moray to 4.6 in Argyll and Bute. A more detailed breakdown showing the rate per 1,000 population by age and sex for each Local Authority is available in Annex B on page 10.

An estimated 4,586 (29 per cent) of all registered partially sighted persons have additional disabilities, around three-quarters (73 per cent) of which are aged 65 and over. Physical disabilities account for over half (56 per cent) and nearly a quarter (22 per cent) are deaf (see Table 2c).

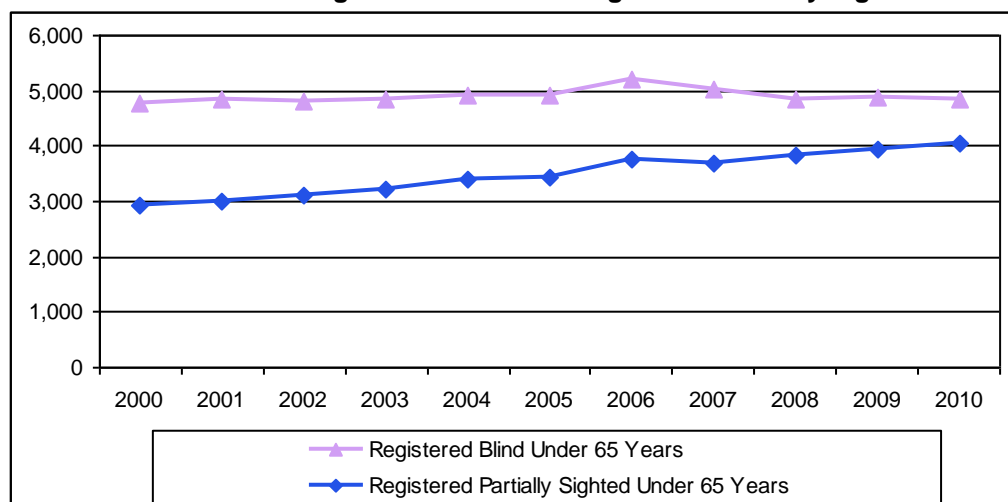

Section 3: Visually Impaired Under 65-year-olds

Time series data showing the number of visually impaired people under the age of 65 over the last 11 years is shown in the chart below. The overall number of people under 65 who are registered blind has remained fairly level, averaging around 4,900 people each year. The number of partially sighted people increased each year between 2000 and 2006, fell in 2007, before rising again between 2008 and 2010.

Overall the number of registered visually impaired under 65-year-olds has increased by around one per cent on last year. The ratio per 1,000 population is at around 2.0. Data on under 65's by local authority and sex is shown in Annex C on page 11.

Section 4 : Background Information:

Data was collected on persons registered with local authorities as at 31st March 2010. New cases are new registrations within the year from 1st April 2009 to 31st March 2010.

The information is derived from returns made to the Scottish Government by Scottish Local Authorities. The return asks for the number of blind and partially sighted persons by age, sex and additional disabilities. It does not include persons who may meet the criteria for being blind or partially sighted but have not registered with their Local Authority.

The Social Work (Scotland) Act 1968 gives Local Authorities the power to maintain a register of people who are blind or partially sighted. However registration is voluntary and while registration provides access to a number of benefits and concessions there remain a large number of people who meet the criteria but are not registered. Research in 1991¹ undertaken at a UK level, indicated that the number of people on registers is some 23 per cent of those eligible. In 2001 they estimated it to be under a third.

'Think dual sensory' published in 1997 by the Department of Health suggested that some 2,000 people in Scotland could have some degree of deafblindness. Our latest figures show that there are 1,473 people registered as deafblind in Scotland and a further 1,003 people registered as partially sighted and deaf. This suggests that people are more likely to register if they have multiple disabilities.

Additionally, there are known data problems prior to 2000 where people have not been removed from the register of blind and partially sighted persons. Many Local Authorities have in recent years improved their registers by comparing with the register of deaths and this may in part explain the decrease in the number of registered blind persons since 2000. Therefore, care should be taken when commenting on trends as the fall in numbers since 2000 is explained in part by improvements in reporting procedures by some Local Authorities.

All calculate rates per 1000 population in this Statistics Release have been based on the appropriate mid-year population estimate from GRO(S). 2010 rates have been calculated using the 2009 mid-year population estimate for example.

Data issues and changes from Previous Years

West Lothian's 2000 partially sighted data, has been updated following the identification of an error. This means that the figures now differ from those previously published within the statistical releases.

Glasgow have substantially revised their figures in recent years following a move to a new management information system. This has resulted in improvements to data quality for 2006 and 2007 but care should be taken when comparing 2005 and 2006 figures as many of the changes seen are largely due to changes in the Glasgow figures. In 2008, they moved to a new management information system and have been cleaning the data as they transfer it. This has resulted in further changes to Glasgow's data, this work was ongoing in 2009 and has resulted in the 2009 figures being amended in this publication.

East Renfrewshire's figures for 2009 have been revised following the identification of an error within their data extraction query code.

In 2007, East Dunbartonshire undertook quality assurance on their data in 2008 and this led to reductions in their figures compared with 2007.

Fife were unable to provide complete information on additional disabilities. Care should therefore be taken when interpreting figures as a small amount of data has been estimated.

Edinburgh, Orkney, Dumfries and Galloway and Scottish Borders undertook data cleaning in 2009. Also in 2009 Dumfries and Galloway had an Eye Care Review; and Scottish Borders have a new Sensory Perception Unit. This work is ongoing in 2010, and Argyll and Bute, Dundee and South Lanarkshire have also undertaken data cleaning.
