

# GDP grew 0.3% in the third quarter of 2019

Gross Domestic Product has increased by 0.3% during the July to September period.

During this period UK GDP also grew by 0.3%.

# Scottish GDP grew by 0.7% over the year


Compared to the same time last year (2018 Q3), Scottish GDP has increased by 0.7%.

Equivalent UK growth over the year was 1.0%.


# Strong quarter for production

In 2019 Q3, output in the Construction sector remained flat (rounding to 0.0%), output in the Production sector increased by 0.9% and output in the Services sector grew by 0.2%.


### Change in GDP compared to last quarter



## Change in GDP compared to the same quarter last year




### Quarterly growth in industry sectors

# Construction and production output falls over past year

Services sees lower growth since 2018. Production industries continue to be volatile but with little underlying growth since 2018.

Following growth during 2018, Construction has fallen in recent quarters.
