

An Experimental Statistics publication for Scotland

ECONOMY AND LABOUR MARKET

1. Summary

On 7 October, while announcing further measures to reduce the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19), the First Minister confirmed new business support to be delivered by local authorities, called the Coronavirus (COVID-19): Restrictions Fund.

This is the first of two releases of statistics on this fund. While payments under the furlough support scheme was part of this fund, the deadline for Local Authorities to return this monitoring information was 15 December 2020, so this data cannot be included in this release. The second release on 29 January 2021 will include these furlough support payment statistics as well as the outcome of any ongoing appeals.

Across Scotland 3,555 awards have been granted from the Hardship Fund and 3,623 awards from the Temporary Closure Fund making a total of 7,178 awards granted.

The vast majority of applications have now been processed, with only 17 applications still awaiting processing (0.2%). Of those that have been processed, 73% (7,178) resulted in an award, while 27% (2,673) were rejected or referred/deferred (Table 1).

For the Temporary Closure Fund, in those businesses with a RV of less than 51k, 77% (3,095) of processed applications were accepted, whilst 23% (925) were rejected. For businesses with an RV greater than £51k, 68% (524) of processed applications were accepted, whilst 32% (249) were rejected.

For the Discretionary Hardship Fund, in those businesses with a RV of less than 51k, 57% (3,012) of processed applications were accepted, whilst 43% (2,258) were rejected. For businesses with an RV greater than £51k, 64% (541) of processed applications were accepted, whilst 36% (308) were rejected.

The total funding available across Scotland was £27 million. Of this, £17 million (63%) has so far been allocated. This shortfall is not unexpected as funding was based on estimated maximum uptake which represented a conservative scenario.

The average fund spent per Local Authority for the Temporary Closure Fund was £621,000.

The average fund spent for the Discretionary Hardship Fund per Local Authority was £172,000.

This support is separate from and in addition to the Coronavirus (COVID-19) Restrictions Fund to support employees and businesses impacted by local COVID-19 restrictions, from 9 October until 1 November. Applications for that funding closed on 3 November.

2. Introduction and background

The COVID-19 Restrictions Fund offered grant support to businesses very directly impacted by the restrictions which applied between 9 October and 2 November.

Closure grants were available for hospitality and other businesses in the central belt which were required to close by the regulations. Hardship grants were available for businesses that were not required to close by the regulations but significantly and directly impacted by the restrictions - such as pubs and restaurants out with the central belt, and some specified businesses in the hospitality supply chain. To be eligible for this support a business had to meet a number of eligibility criteria which were set out on the Scottish Government website. This included that the business premises must have been registered for Non-Domestic rates, and the level of grant award was dependent on the rateable value of the premises. Businesses that pay rates through their landlords rather than directly to a Council were also eligible to apply.

This Fund was administered by Local Authorities on behalf Scottish Government, and closed to applications on 3 November 2020.

3. COVID-19 Business support fund applications

3.1 Application status

Across Scotland 3,555 awards have been granted from the Hardship Fund and 3,623 awards from the Temporary Closure Fund making a total of 7,178 awards granted.

The vast majority of applications have now been processed, with only 17 applications still awaiting processing (0.2%). Of those that have been processed, 73% (7,178) resulted in an award, while 27% (2,673) were rejected or referred/deferred (Table 1).

The proportion of rejections for applications to the Hardship Fund is 43% compared to the Temporary Closure Fund at 0.2%.

3.2 Application status by Local Authority (LA)


The percentage of rejections was 27% at a national level, with an average of 83 in each LA.

3.2.1 Discretionary Hardship Fund by Local Authority

The percentage of applications awaiting processing, awarded, rejected and referred/deferred varied across Local Authorities (LA), see Figure 1. The percentage of awards was 57% at a national level, ranging between 23% and 87% at LA level translating to an average number of 111 awards across LAs.

Applications may be rejected, referred or deferred for a number of reasons including multiple applications made by a single business, not meeting the eligibility criteria or requiring additional information to be provided.

Figure 1 Hardship Grant Application Status by Local Authority




3.3 Temporary Closure Grant by Local Authority

The maximum number of temporary closure grant applications at Local Authority level was 1,242 with the number of applications, as would be expected, correlating with the size of the Local Authority.

The proportions of applications accepted ranged between 91% (77) and 57% (88).

Overall, only 32 applications for temporary closure grant across Scotland were referred or deferred and 17 applications across Scotland were still outstanding at the time of reporting.

3.4 Application status by rateable value

Due to the reporting process the number of applications awaiting processing cannot be disaggregated by rateable value (RV).

For the Temporary Closure Fund, in those businesses with a RV of less than 51k, 77% (3,095) of processed applications were accepted, whilst 23% (925) were rejected. For businesses with an RV greater than £51k, 68% (524) of processed applications were accepted, whilst 32% (249) were rejected.

For the Discretionary Hardship Fund, in those businesses with a RV of less than 51k, 57% (3,012) of processed applications were accepted, whilst 43% (2,258) were rejected. For businesses with an RV greater than £51k, 64% (541) of processed applications were accepted, whilst 36% (308) were rejected.

3.4.1 Temporary Closure Fund by Rateable Value and Local Authority

As shown in Table 3 for larger businesses with a rateable value over 51K 13 Local Authorities awarded grants to over half the Temporary Closure Fund applicants resulting in 482awards.

For larger businesses with a rateable value over £51k, the range in proportions of awards to applications processed by Local Authority, was 100% to 12%.

The highest level for applications at Local Authority Level from businesses with an RV less than £51k was 1,011 of which 63% (633) resulted in awards. The highest proportion of awards for temporary closure funding for businesses with an RV less than £51k was 100% (109, 225 and 122).

3.4.2 Discretionary Hardship Fund – by Rateable value and Local Authority

As is shown in Table 4, 17 Local Authorities awarded over half of the applications for businesses with an RV of less than £51k and 25 Local Authorities awarded over half of the applications for businesses with an RV of greater than £51k

4. Uptake and spend against budget

The total funding available across Scotland was £27 million. Of this, £17 million (63%) has so far been allocated. This shortfall is not unexpected as funding was based on estimated maximum uptake which represented a conservative scenario.

4.1 LA level spend and budget

4.1.1 Temporary Closure fund

At Local Authority Level uptake of funding for Local Authorities impacted by the restrictions the Temporary Closure Fund ranged between 50% (£272,000) and 104% (£167,000). The average fund spent for those Local Authorities who had eligible businesses is £621,000

Most Local Authorities did not exceed their budget allocation, although as the scheme was demand led, any LAs exceeding their budget is neither unexpected nor problematic.

4.1.2 Discretionary Hardship Fund

At Local Authority Level uptake of funding for the Discretionary Hardship Fund ranged between 29% (£10,000) and 83% (£93,000). The average fund spent per Local Authority was £172,000.

5. Methodology

5.1 Data collection

5.2 Data collection

Each Local Authority in Scotland has recorded information relating to applications received for the Strategic Framework Business Fund. Local Authorities in Scotland are the owners of these data.

Scottish Government asked all Local Authorities in Scotland to provide the following information, via a standardised excel template, for publication purposes;

- Number of applications received
- Number of applications rejected
- Number of applications referred or deferred
- Number of applications accepted (and therefore a grant awarded)
- Value of grants awarded

Scottish Government asked that this information be provided for both grants and business sectors, and within each fund for the information to be further split by rateable value (less than/equal to £51k and over £51k)

The requested information was to cover the period 9 October to 2 November. Information on support for furloughed workers was collected alongside this. The deadline for submission was 15 December..

5.3 Data reporting

The information received from each Local Authority was amalgamated into a single dataset. This dataset was drawn from the templates received and aimed to create national level figures. There are some caveats to this approach;

- In some returns the stated number of applications received was lower than
 the sum of the application status categories (awaiting processing, rejected,
 referred or deferred and awarded). In these cases, the total number of
 applications has been recalculated to equal this sum.
- In other returns, the total number of applications exceeded the sum of the application status categories (awaiting processing, rejected, referred or deferred and awarded). In these cases it has been assumed that the discrepancy is caused by additional applications 'awaiting processing' and that figure has therefore been updated accordingly.
- Some Local Authorities did not disaggregate the information by rateable value. Disaggregated information has been calculated and provided wherever possible.
- Due to the timelines of data collection and analysis the support for furloughed workers data was not included in this publication. It is scheduled to we part of a second publication on this fund, alongside results of appeals.

An experimental statistics publication for Scotland

This is the first publication of these statistics and therefore they are labelled as experimental statistics. Experimental statistics are defined by the Code of Practice for Statistics as 'a subset of newly developed or innovative official statistics undergoing evaluation, that are published in order to involve users and stakeholders in the assessment of their suitability and quality at an early stage'. Official and National Statistics are produced to high professional standards set out in the Code of Practice for Official Statistics. Both undergo regular quality assurance reviews to ensure that they meet customer needs and are produced free from any political interference.
